
## DEMOLAY

### CANDIDATES ARE THE PRIORITY

Recently during the candidate education after one of the degrees, we suffered a sizable interruption while one of our presenters was discussing the degree with the class. While this was a particularly egregious example, interruptions to the class are sadly not uncommon. To be clear, I do not think any of these interruptions are done maliciously but rather out of unawareness. There is a lot of activity in our Valley, and sometimes that unknowingly carries over into the candidate's room, which is completely understandable. I share this story not to complain or chastise but to make us aware of what may be a bigger concern, we need to be conscious of our candidate's experience. We need to remember the candidates are the priority.

Like all masonic bodies, our Valley suffers from declining membership. This comes

from both a drop in new members coming in, as well as old members walking away, a decline in both recruitment and retention. If we do not make the candidate experience a priority, this can negatively affect our membership. A candidate that does not feel like a priority is less likely to feel at home when they become a member. A member who does not feel at home is less likely to bring in new members. This can be a vicious cycle and can contribute to rapid decline in our rolls.

A quality experience can go a long way. By keeping the candidates the focus of our aims, from dinner to the degrees and beyond, we may be doing more to increase membership than many of our grandest events. I am not advocating for any specific changes but to change the way we may be thinking about the experience, simply to remind us to be aware of the candidates over all things. Let us remember that, as much fun as we have at the Scottish Rite, our degree cycles exist primarily for them. We can make our Valley that much better and sustainable into the future when we remember that the candidates are always the priority.
